






# Investing in Students



## **ASI Student Financial Support**

Three of the financial services for funding opportunities: ASI Leadership Funding, Student Emergency Fund, and Sustainability Projects Funding. Each of these services have separate guidelines and applications.




- A total of \$113,028 was awarded to students through the three financial services.
- \$22,528 was awarded to students through the ASI Leadership Fund.
- \$80,500 was awarded to the Student Emergency Fund.
- \$10,000 was awarded to the Sustainability Projects Fund.



## **Student Emergency Fund**

The ASI Student Emergency Fund (SEF) provides compassionate assistance to students who encounter unforeseen financial emergencies or catastrophic events that disrupt their progress towards a degree.

## **Sustainability Projects Funding**

The Sustainability Projects Funding (SPF) allocates funds to provide support for essential educational experiences and activities that aid and supplement the fundamental educational mission of CSUSM.



#### **Wellness and Recreation**

In 2019 ASI passed a Resolution in support to finding a path for a Wellness and Recreation Facility at CSUSM.

For four years ASI advocated for the students to find a solution to this problem.

On April 9th 2024 CSUSM Campus Recreation took the lead in running a referendum that CSUSM students voted 59.9% to 38.6% to not increase the Recreation Fee to support a Wellness and Recreation Facility.




## **Campus Activities Board (CAB)**



## **ASI Cougar Pantry Initiatives**

#### **Mini Fridges**:

The ASI Cougar Pantry was awarded funds through Feeding San Diego's Agency Capacity Pass – Thru Funding Grant in 2023. This grant allowed ASI to purchase ten (10) mini fridges that were placed throughout campus to help ensure CSUSM students to have access to produce and snacks when not able to visit the ASI Cougar Pantry location in Commons 104.

#### **Retail Rescue:**

Food at the ASI Cougar Pantry is all purchased through either the North County Food Bank, Feeding San Diego or acquired through a food rescue program called retail rescue.Retail rescue or food rescue is the process of acquiring food from an outside source that would otherwise go to waste and redirecting it to someone in need.

A total of 45,815 pounds of food was rescued from 3 retailers; Albertsons, Costco and Sprouts through a weekly pick up process.
