PREAMBLE

We, the undergraduate students of Emerson College, in order to establish an effective student government, represent student interests, establish and facilitate all recognized student organizations, act as a liaison between the student body, the administration, and the Board of Trustees, and promote and protect the rights of the students indiscriminate of race, color, national and ethnic origin, sex, gender, age, sexual orientation, handicap, or religion do hereby establish this constitution for the Student Government Association of Emerson College.

ARTICLE I NAME

The name of this organization shall be The Student Government Association of Emerson College. (Hereafter referred to as SGA.)

ARTICLE II PURPOSE

The purpose of SGA includes but is not limited to the following:

Represent student interests, rights, and concerns;

Stimulate student awareness of and involvement in the many organizations, activities, and opportunities available in the Emerson Community;

Promote student awareness and appreciation of the values and traditions of Emerson College and the SGA:

Enhance communication/cooperation between all segments of the campus community;

And, provide funding for student activities and organizations through a fair and representative annual process.

ARTICLE III MEMBERSHIP

Active membership includes all currently registered Emerson College undergraduate students who are enrolled in a degree-granting program and have paid a student activities fee. An active membership entitles individuals to:

Vote in all SGA elections;

Be represented by SGA officers;

Hold SGA office (See Article VII);

Participate in SGA sponsored organizations and events;

And other rights, privileges, and benefits established by SGA bills, resolutions, and recommendations.

ARTICLE IV GOVERNMENTAL ORGANIZATION

The government shall be a democracy based on three branches: the executive (Executive Council), the representative (Senate), and judicial (Chief Justice).

Section One: Executive Branch

- A. The Chief Executive of SGA shall be the President.
- B. The executive officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Treasurer, and four Class Presidents. These officers shall be elected and serve a term not to exceed one (1) academic year, unless re-elected. (See Glossary)
- C. All elected executive officers shall have one (1) vote in the Executive Council meetings and in the Joint Sessions, with the exception of the President who shall vote only in the case of a tie. (See Article IV, Section One, G.1.g) (See Glossary)
- D. The president shall appoint officers who, together with the aforementioned officers, form the Executive Council.
 - 1. The appointed officers shall consist of the following:
 - a. Secretary
 - b. Public Relations Commissioner
 - c. Multicultural Commissioner
 - d. Vice-Treasurer (with Treasurer's endorsement)
 - e. Gay, Lesbian, Bi-Sexual, and Transgender Commissioner
 - f. Spiritual Life Commissioner
 - g. Athletics Commissioner
 - h. Greek Life Commissioner
 - i. Others as deemed necessary
 - 2. These officers shall serve a term not to exceed one (1) academic year unless reappointed.
 - 3. All appointments to the Executive Council shall be confirmed by a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of Joint Session
- E. The Executive Council shall meet when deemed necessary by the President.
- F. Powers and Responsibilities of Elected Officers
 - 1. President
 - a. The President is the official representative of the student body.

- b. The President is responsible for executing legislation and directing programs as established by the Senate and Executive Council and provided for in the SGA budget.
- c. The President must either approve or veto any legislation passed in Joint Session. To veto legislation, the President must submit a written statement of objections to the Senate and the Executive Council within five (5) school days. If the President does not take action within this specified period, the legislation shall become law. A veto may be overturned by a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of a Joint Session.
- d. The President shall report on the state of the student body at the first and last Joint Session of each academic year. The meetings shall be advertised and promoted throughout the College community.
- e. The President will appoint all committee members as requested by the College administration.
- f. The President shall chair all Executive Council and Joint Session meetings and shall only have a vote in the case of a tie.
- g. The President shall have the power to call special Executive Council and Joint Session meetings as deemed necessary.
- h. The President of SGA shall meet on a regular basis with appropriate members of the College administration.
- i. The President shall call an All Student Assembly at least once every academic year.

2. Vice-President

- a. The Vice-President shall assume the office and duties of the President if the office becomes vacant within the one (1) year term.
- b. The Vice-President is a member of the Executive Council.
- c. The Vice-President is the presiding officer of the Senate and may only cast a vote in the case of a tie. The Vice-President is also the liaison between the Senate and the Executive Council. (See also Senate By-Laws)
- d. The Vice-President shall have the power to call special Senate meetings as deemed necessary.
- e. The Vice-President shall have a vote at all Executive Council and Joint Session meetings.
- f. The Vice-President shall be the co-chair of the Organizational Recognition and Review Board (ORRB) with the Associate Dean of Students. (See Glossary)
- g. The Vice-President shall serve as the liaison between SGA and student organizations.
- h. The Vice-President shall record and maintain written records of the Executive Council and Joint Session proceedings in the absence of the SGA Secretary.

3. Treasurer

- a. The Treasurer, in conjunction with the President, is responsible for conducting and overseeing all financial workings of SGA.
- b. The Treasurer shall chair the Financial Advisory Board (FAB.)

- c. The outgoing Treasurer, in conjunction with the Treasurer-elect, who shall chair budget hearings, is responsible for preparing the annual SGA budget for the following academic year. The budget must be prepared by April 30.
- d. The Treasurer shall chair all financial appeals hearings.
- e. The Treasurer shall ensure that all satellite campuses receive their SGA funding at the beginning of each semester.
- f. The Treasurer may endorse a Vice-Treasurer to be appointed by the President and confirmed by Joint Session.
- g. The Treasurer is responsible for closing the budget for the fiscal year.
- h. The Treasurer of SGA shall meet on a regular basis with the appropriate members of the College administration.

4. Class Presidents

- a. Class Presidents shall represent the interests and concerns of their respective classes.
- b. Class Presidents shall act as the Chief Executives of their respective class governments and are thus responsible for their conduct.
- c. Class Presidents shall take on additional responsibilities as deemed necessary by the president and/or Executive Council.

G. Powers and Responsibilities of Appointed Officers

1. Secretary

- a. The Secretary shall record and maintain written records of all Executive Council and Joint Session proceedings. In the absence of the Secretary, the Vice-President shall assume this duty.
- b. The Secretary shall distribute the minutes of each meeting to all officers within forty-eight (48) hours.
- c. The Secretary shall post, for public viewing, the minutes of each meeting within forty-eight (48) hours. (See Executive Council By-Laws)
- d. The Secretary shall handle all correspondence as deemed necessary by the President of SGA.
- e. The Secretary shall maintain the SGA office in an efficient and organized manner.
- f. The Secretary shall take on additional responsibilities as deemed necessary by the President and/or Executive Council.

2. Public Relations Commissioner

- a. The Public Relations Commissioner shall publicize and promote SGA throughout the College community.
- b. The Public Relations Commissioner shall take on additional responsibilities as deemed necessary by the President and/or Executive Council.

3. Multicultural Commissioner

- a. The Multicultural Commissioner shall serve as the liaison between SGA and culturally based student organizations.
- b. The Multicultural Commissioner shall advise SGA on any culturally sensitive matters.

c. The Multicultural Commissioner shall take on additional responsibilities as deemed necessary by the President and/or the Executive Council.

4. Spiritual Life Commissioner

- a. The Spiritual Life Commissioner shall serve as the liaison between SGA and the spiritual community at Emerson.
- b. The Spiritual Life Commissioner shall advise SGA on any matters sensitive to Spiritual Life.
- c. The Spiritual Life Commissioner shall take on additional responsibilities as deemed necessary by the President and/or the Executive Council.

5. Athletics Commissioner

- a. The Athletics Commissioner shall serve as the liaison between SGA and the athletics department.
- b. The Athletics Commissioner shall advise SGA on any sensitive matters pertaining to athletics at Emerson.
- c. The Athletics Commissioner shall take on additional responsibilities as deemed necessary by the President and/or the Executive Council.

6. Greek Life Commissioner

- a. The Greek Life Commissioner shall serve as the liaison between SGA and Greek Life.
- b. The Greek Life Commissioner shall advise SGA on any matters sensitive to Greek Life.
- c. The Greek Life Commissioner shall take on additional responsibilities as deemed necessary by the President and/or the Executive Council.

7. The Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual Transgender (GLBT) Commissioner

- a. The GLBT Commissioner shall serve as the liaison between SGA and the GLBT community.
- b. The GLBT Commissioner shall advise SGA on any matters sensitive to the GLBT community.
- c. The GLBT Commissioner shall take on additional responsibilities as deemed necessary by the President and/or the Executive Council.

8. Vice-Treasurer

- a. The Vice-Treasurer shall assist the Treasurer on all financial proceedings as deemed necessary by the Treasurer.
- b. The Vice-Treasurer shall have a seat on the Financial Advisory Board and has one (1) vote, except in the annual budget hearings.
- c. The Vice-Treasurer shall take on the financial responsibilities of the SGA in the absence of the Treasurer.
- d. The Vice-Treasurer shall take on additional responsibilities as deemed necessary by the President and/or Executive Council.

9. RHA Commissioner

- a. The RHA Commissioner shall serve as the liaison between SGA and RHA.
- b. The RHA Commissioner shall advise SGA on any matters sensitive to RHA.
- c. The RHA Commissioner shall take on additional responsibilities as deemed necessary by the President and/or Executive Council.

10. Off Campus Student Commissioner

- a. The Off Campus Student Commissioner shall serve as the liaison between SGA and students living Off Campus.
- b. The Off Campus Student Commissioner shall advise SGA on any matters sensitive to students living Off Campus.
- c. The Off Campus Student Commissioner shall take on additional responsibilities as deemed necessary by the President and/or Executive Council.

11. External Programs Commissioner

- a. The External Programs Commissioner shall serve as the liaison between SGA and students at an External Program.
- b. The External Program Commissioner shall advise SGA on any matters sensitive to students at an external program.
- c. The External Program Commissioner shall communicate with at least one representative from each of Emerson's external programs.
- d. The External Programs Commissioner shall take on additional responsibilities as deemed necessary by the President and/or Executive Council.

12. Transfer Student Commissioner

- a. The Transfer Student Commissioner shall serve as the liaison between SGA and Transfer Students.
- b. The Transfer Student Commissioner shall advise SGA on any matters sensitive to Transfer Students.
- c. The Transfer Student Commissioner shall take on additional responsibilities as deemed necessary by the President and/or Executive Council.

13. Service Learning Commissioner

- a. The Service Learning Commissioner shall serve as the liaison between SGA and Service Learning Community.
- b. The Service Learning Commissioner shall advise SGA on any matters sensitive to the Service Learning community.
- c. The Service Learning Commissioner shall take on additional responsibilities as deemed necessary by the President and/or Executive Council.

14. Student Disabilities and Accessibility Commissioner

- a. The Student Disabilities and Accessibility Commissioner shall serve as a liaison between SGA and students with learning, physical, psychological and/or medical disabilities.
- b. The Student Disabilities and Accessibility Commissioner shall advise SGA on any matters sensitive to students with disabilities.
- c. The Student Disabilities and Accessibility Commissioner shall advocate for policies that provide qualified students with disabilities equal access to the College's programs, classes, activities and services.
- d. The Student Disabilities and Accessibility Commissioner shall be responsible for raising awareness for needs of students with disability and access issues with all students at Emerson College.

e. The Student Disabilities and Accessibility Commissioner shall take on additional responsibilities as deemed necessary by the President and/or Executive Council.

H. Commissioner's Council

- 1. Representation
 - a. The President of SGA shall preside over Commissioner's Council. All seats in Commissioner's Council shall have (1) vote each and shall consist of the following positions:
 - 1. Service Learning Commissioner
 - 2. Multicultural Commissioner
 - 3. Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual and Transgender Commissioner
 - 4. Spiritual Life Commissioner
 - 5. Athletics Commissioner
 - 6. Greek Life Commissioner
 - 7. RHA Commissioner
 - 8. Off Campus Commissioner
 - 9. External Programs Commissioner
 - 10. Transfer Student Commissioner
 - 11. Others as deemed necessary by the President
 - b. The Commissioner's Council shall, by their third meeting of the academic year, elect a Vice-President who shall preside over Commissioner's Council in the absence of the President.
- 2. Powers and Responsibilities
 - a. The Commissioner's Council shall act as the chief liaison between specific student populations and the SGA.
 - b. Any commissioner may initiate legislation, initiatives, and acts within Joint Session through motions. A commissioner may not second a motion.
 - c. Each commissioner will have one (1) vote in Commissioner's Council meetings. Commissioner's Council may pass legislation by a 2/3 vote and then present it to Joint Session to be discussed and voted on.
 - d. The commissioner's council shall meet bi-monthly. More meetings may be called as deemed necessary by the President.

Section Two: Representative Branch

A. Senate

- 1. The Vice-President of SGA shall preside over the Senate. All seats in the Senate shall have one (1) vote each and be determined in the following manner
 - a. One seat for each degree-granting division of the College
 - b. One seat for each class government
- B. Powers and Responsibilities
 - 1. The Senate shall act as the chief liaison between students and the SGA.
 - 2. The Senate may initiate legislation, initiatives, and acts within SGA.
 - 3. Each Senator shall have one (1) vote in Senate and Joint Session meetings.
 - 4. The Senate shall meet when deemed necessary by the Vice President.

Section Three: Judicial Process

A. The judicial powers of the Student Government Association shall be vested in the Chief Justice.

B. Appointment

- 1. The Chief Justice shall be appointed by the SGA President and subject to approval of a Joint Session.
- 2. The Chief Justice may remain in office as long as eligibility is maintained, not to exceed eight (8) semesters (summer sessions not included).
- 3. The Chief Justice must have been enrolled at Emerson College for at least one (1) semester prior to appointment.

C. Duties and Powers

- 1. The Chief Justice shall, upon request of a member of SGA, interpret the Constitution and review the constitutionality of any action or legislation.
- 2. The Chief Justice shall be charged with the responsibility of reviewing all SGA recognized club constitutions to ensure their compliance with the SGA constitution.
- 3. The Chief Justice may enact impeachment proceedings of any SGA officer. (See Article VIII)
- 4. The Chief Justice shall preside over impeachment hearings of all SGA officers in accordance with Article VIII.
- 5. The Chief Justice shall hear all organizational and student grievances and recommend a course of action.
- 6. The Chief Justice shall oversee all general and special elections.

D. Deputy Chief Justice

- 1. The SGA President may appoint a Deputy Chief Justice if requested by the Chief Justice (subject to approval of the Joint Session).
- 2. The Deputy's duties will include assisting the Chief Justice in his/her duties as requested.
- 3. The Deputy Chief Justice will assume the authority of the Chief Justice:
 - a. in the event that the Chief Justice recuses himself/herself from any case.
 - b. in the absence of the Chief Justice.
- 4. The term of the Deputy Chief Justice will end when the term of the Chief Justice under whom he/she was appointed has ended.

Section Four: Financial Advisory Board (FAB)

- A. The Financial Advisory Board shall have the responsibility to develop and recommend the annual SGA budget, which shall be approved at a Joint Session.
- B. The annual SGA Budget shall be developed and approved by April 30 of the year before the budget is acclimated.
- C. The annual budget hearings shall be chaired by the newly elected SGA Treasurer, who may only vote in the case of a tie. Voting members shall include the outgoing SGA Treasurer and four (4) non-elected class representatives. The Vice-Treasurer shall sit in as a non-voting member of the board. (See FAB By-Laws)
- D. Additional FAB hearings shall follow the FAB By-Laws.
- E. FAB shall allocate eight percent (8%) of the student activities fees collected to the student newspaper, to be dispersed at the beginning of the fall semester.

F. FAB shall investigate any charges of financial misconduct by any SGA funded organization.

Section Five: Organization Recognition and Review Board (ORRB)

- A. The ORRB shall have the responsibility to create or deny any new SGA funded organizations or interest groups.
- B. The ORRB shall be co-chaired by the Vice President of SGA and the Associate Dean of Students. The ORRB shall consist of one (1) representative from each class, the SGA secretary, and one (1) (optional) faculty member.
- C. The ORRB shall meet once per semester.
- D. Additional ORRB hearings shall follow the ORRB By-Laws.

Section Six: Advisors

There shall be two (2) advisors for this organization: the Associate Dean of Students and a full-time faculty member to be selected by each administration.

ARTICLE V MEETINGS

- All SGA official meetings shall:
 - Follow Robert's Rules of Order (Revised).
 - Be open to all Emerson students. A meeting may only be closed in the case of a sensitive issue. (See appropriate By-Laws)
 - Be documented in the form of minutes and include all motions made and votes taken.
 - Quorum shall be obtained when half or more of the voting members are present.

ARTICLE VI STUDENT ORGANIZATIONS

Section One: Recognition Requirements

- A. All organizations must have on file an approved constitution.
- B. All organizations must stay within the approved SGA budget allocation set forth by FAB.
- C. All SGA funding must be spent for the benefit of undergraduate students.
- D. All SGA funded organizations must be open to all undergraduate students.
- E. All organizations must comply with Registration and Hazing Requirements established by the Office of Student Life.

ARTICLE VII ELECTIONS AND APPOINTMENTS

Section One: Elections

- A. An Elections Commissioner shall be appointed by the SGA President to conduct all standard and special elections.
- B. Elections shall be handled as specifically outlined in the Elections By-Laws.

Section Two: Qualifications

- A. President, Vice-President, and Treasurer
 - 1. Must have completed one (1) full academic year of enrollment in Emerson College.
 - 2. Must have a minimum cumulative grade point average of 2.5 prior to elections and during term of office.
 - 3. Must have submitted a petition to run for office to the SGA Elections Commissioner with no less than fifty (50) valid signatures and ID numbers of registered Emerson College undergraduate students.
 - 4. Must comply with all election procedures as stated in Article VII and the Elections By-Laws.
 - 5. Must be an undergraduate student registered and enrolled in a minimum of twelve (12) credits at the Boston campus throughout his/her term.
- B. All other elected and appointed officers
 - 1. Must have a minimum grade point average of 2.5 before the election or appointment and during his/her term of office. If the student is a first semester student, s/he must have approval from his/her academic advisor.
 - 2. Must comply with all election procedures.
 - 3. Must have submitted a petition to run for office to the SGA Elections Commission with no less than fifty (50) valid signatures and ID numbers of registered Emerson College undergraduate students.
 - 4. Must be registered and enrolled in a minimum of four (4) credits at the Boston campus throughout their term.

Section Three: Seating

- A. To be elected, all candidates must receive a majority (at least 51%) of all votes cast in a general election of the entire Emerson College, Boston campus, undergraduate population. In the case that there is no majority, another election must take place within five (5) school days between the two candidates receiving the highest number of votes in the first election.
- B. No SGA officer shall serve in more than one (1) branch concurrently.
- C. Senators shall be elected by their respective constituent bodies. Divisional senators may only be elected by undergraduate students majoring in their respective divisions, and class senators shall only be elected by their respective classes.
- D. If either the Vice-President or Treasurer position becomes vacant within any given academic year, a special election shall be held under the same guidelines as the original election. If either position becomes vacant in the second semester, the SGA president shall appoint a replacement subject to approval by a Joint Session. (See Elections By-Laws)

Section Four: Timeline

- A. Elections for the following academic year shall be held on either the last Tuesday and Wednesday of March or the first Tuesday and Wednesday of April.
- B. The week following elections shall be a mandatory interim training session where all former officers train the newly elected officers.

C. There shall be a Joint Session in the week following the training period, where an inaugural ceremony shall pass all powers of office to the incoming administration.

Section Five: Standard and Special Elections

- A. There shall be one (1) standard SGA election each year.
- B. Special elections shall comply with all election procedures and meet all requirements of general elections. (See Elections By-Laws)
- C. Special elections shall be called by the President of SGA when mandated by a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of a Joint Session, or by initiative, referendum, or recall actions. (Refer to Article IX: Sections One, Two, and Three)
- D. All elections shall be conducted according to the Australian Ballot System. (See Glossary)

ARTICLE VIII IMPEACHMENTS

Section One: Grounds for Impeachment

- A. Any officer of SGA who knowingly evades his/her duties as set down by this constitution, or commits any act that is determined to be detrimental to the welfare of the student body is subject to impeachment.
- B. No officer may be brought up under the same charges twice.

Section Two: Impeachment Initiation

- A. Impeachment proceedings may be initiated by the Chief Justice or a majority (51%) vote of either the Executive Council or the Senate. Initiation is the act of bringing the officer in question up for review before a Joint Session.
- B. Upon review of the officer in question, the impeachment issue shall be tabled until the following Joint Session, where a vote shall be taken as to whether or not to continue with impeachment proceedings.
- C. A two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of Joint Session is required to continue impeachment proceedings.
- D. Accused officers must abstain from all impeachment votes taken.
- E. If the motion carries, impeachment proceedings shall begin immediately. The officer charged must be notified in writing within forty-eight (48) hours or the impeachment must be dropped.

Section Three: Impeachment Proceedings

- A. The Chief Justice shall preside over all impeachment hearings. In the event that the Chief Justice is accused, the SGA President shall be the presiding officer.
- B. Both the Executive Council and Senate shall be present.
- C. A motion shall be made to review the officer in question.
- D. The officer in question shall be given the opportunity to speak in his/her defense and offer evidence as s/he deems necessary.
- E. Following full discussion, the motion shall be voted on immediately.
- F. If the officer in question holds an appointed position, following a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote to impeach him/her, that officer is terminated. If the officer in question is

an elected officer, following a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote to impeach him/her, a special election for impeachment shall be called. (See Article VII, Section Four)

G. Impeachment elections shall follow the exact guidelines of the officer's original election.

ARTICLE IX INITIATIVE, REFERENDUM, RECALL

Section One: Initiative

Any member of the student body may initiate legislation by petition. The petition shall have signatures and ID numbers of at least five percent (5%) of the current semester's enrollment. This petition shall be submitted to the President of the SGA. The President shall present the initiative at a Joint Session, where it shall either be passed or submitted within ten (10) school days to a vote of the student body. At least five percent (5%) of the student body must vote in the election. A majority vote of all votes cast shall be necessary for adoption. (See Glossary)

Section Two: Referendum

All sections of this government shall be subjected to a referendum vote of the student body. A written petition with signatures and ID numbers of at least five percent (5%) of the current semester's enrollment shall be necessary for referendum. This petition shall be presented to the President of the SGA. The President shall present the referendum at a Joint Session. The Joint Session shall either rescind the action or call an election within ten (10) school days after the filing of the said petition. At least five percent (5%) of the student body must vote in the election. A majority vote (51%) of all votes cast shall be necessary to rescind the action. (See Glossary)

Section Three: Recall

All elected officers of this organization shall be subjected to recall by the student body. A written petition with signatures and ID numbers of at least ten percent (10%) of the current semester's enrollment shall constitute a request for recall. Upon presentation of said petition to a Joint Session of SGA, a recall election shall be called within fifteen (15) school days. A two-thirds (2/3) majority of the votes cast shall be required to recall an elected officer, with this number being at least two-thirds (2/3) the number of votes cast in the officer's original election. (See Glossary)

ARTICLE X AMENDING PROCEDURE

Section One

Amendments to this Constitution may be proposed by a three-quarter (3/4) vote of a Joint Session or by a petition signed with ID numbers of at least ten percent (10%) of the current semester's enrollment of the student body and presented to the Joint Session.

Section Two

Proposed amendments to this Constitution shall be posted on the Boston campus at locations specified by the By-Laws for at least three (3) days, not to exceed ten (10) school days before submission to the students for voting. At least ten percent (10%) of the student body must vote in the election. A simple majority (51%) of all votes cast shall be necessary for adoption. The external campuses shall be notified of any proposed amendments.

ARTICLE XI BY-LAWS

- A. Each branch of this government shall develop and adopt By-Laws to serve as more specific guidelines.
- B. These By-Laws shall elaborate on duties, responsibilities, and objectives set forth by this Constitution, as well as any other guidelines necessary for operation of each prospective branch
- C. By-Laws should be developed and adopted by the second Joint Session of the fall semester.
- D. A majority vote (51%) of each prospective branch is necessary for adoption of their own By-Laws.

ARTICLE XII PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY

In all instances not covered by the Constitution and By-Laws, the Parliamentary Authority shall be Robert's Rules of Order (Revised).

ARTICLE XIII ADOPTION

This Constitution, upon ratification by a majority of the votes cast in an election, has been in effect as of November 30, 1999.

GLOSSARY

Australian Ballot System: An official ballot listing candidates for election to public office and distributed inside the polling place to be marked by the voter in secret: it originated in Australia and is widely used in the United States. This is the voting format that will be used for SGA Elections. (See Article VII)

By Laws: A secondary law or rule adopted by an organization or assembly for governing its own meetings or affairs.

Initiative: The right of a legislature to introduce new legislation on some specified matter; the right of a group of citizens to introduce a matter for legislation either to the legislature or directly to the voters; the procedure by which such matters are introduced, usually a petition signed by a percentage of the voters. (See Article IX, Section One)

Joint Session: A meeting where the Executive Council and the Senate meet together; this meeting takes place every other week.

Organizational Recognition and Review Board: A recognition and review board for the student organizations of Emerson College. It is run by the Office of Student Life.

Recall: The process of removing, or right to remove, an official from office by popular vote. (See Article IX, Section Three)

Referendum: The submission of a law, proposed or already in effect, to a direct vote of the people; the right of the people to vote directly on such laws, superceding or overruling the legislature; the vote itself. (See Article IX, Section Two)

Term: A set period of time; duration of time in which an officer may hold office (1 academic year) (See Article IV, Section One)
